SOLAR PROJECTS

The project is now at the scoping study stage and has undergone some significant changes from its original proposal. The scoping study is estimated to take 6-12 months to complete.

URANQUINTY CONCERT DELIGHT

It was great to see so many regular concert goers travel to Uranquinty as well as, local residents and students from Uranquinty Public School who enjoyed an entertaining hour of music. It was a musically rich and technically demanding concert that showcased the viola. Riverina Conservatorium of Music strings teacher Jacqueline Smith bought to the fore the string sections 'middle voice' in multiple formats including classical, contemporary and folk. Joining Jacqueline was fellow RCM teaching staff Rhiannon Xeros (violin), Harold Gretton (classical guitar), Carmel Ryan (piano) and Larissa Burak (voice/bandura).

AGILE LIBRARY

A change in library services will be the new Agile Library service, which features two custom-designed library vans operating a weekly service, delivering books, library services and programs to suburbs and rural villages across the Local Government Area.

While the delivery of the custom-designed vans has been delayed due to COVID impacts on the contractor, the new agile service will still start as planned from 1 July. There will be a click and collect car and van service in place to commence the Agile Library service until the specialised vehicles arrive in mid-August.

Our project will engage the children in a variety of visual arts and weaving experiences over the next couple of months. These completed art pieces will then be put together to make one big art piece. It was lovely to have Tyler Forrell from TRAC, on work experience recently. Tyler came to Uranquinty Preschool when she was four and five years old.

Tyler is still very creative and was a great help when we were making patterns on old vertical blinds. These will be woven into our art project. We have recently been on two excursions. Our first excursion was with Kapooka Preschool to the Marrambidya Wetlands. Mark Saddler who is a Wiradjuri man, guided us along the track past the river. We stopped several times to listen to Mark's stories about Aboriginal art, language and culture.

This was a great day of learning on Wiradjuri Country. Our second excursion was to the Civic Theatre to watch the production of Guess How Much I Love You? This was a great opportunity for the children to see a story portrayed in a different way. The children really



enjoyed the puppetry and the use of different effects to create the changing seasons.

Presently, the children are very interested in the different zones in the ocean. This interest, stemmed from the play space we offered for Ocean Day. We are now exploring the different creatures that live









near the shore and the others that live deep below the ocean.

Maree Crosskell said it was a tremendous honour to receive the award in the CWA's centenary year.






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Uranquinty Power Station Update June 2022



Uranquinty Power Station (UPS) is owned and operated by Origin Energy. The station comprises four gas turbines with a total generating capacity of 640-megawatts (MW) using natural gas.

Station Update

With the change in weather, we have seen a huge demand for energy. This is turn saw the Australian Energy Market (AEMO) suspend the wholesale electricity spot market. The wholesale electricity spot market is where generators sell electricity and retailers buy it to on-sell to consumers. This market is overseen by AEMO and it was the first time since the National Energy Market has been in operation that AEMO has taken the step to suspend the whole market. It also meant the regulator instructed Uranquinty Power Station to operate much more than usual to ensure reliable energy is available to the market.

Origin has always responded and adapted to rapidly changing market dynamics, and most importantly remains focused on the singular goal of keeping our assets running and maintaining reliable supply to our customers and communities. Whilst we always prepare for different seasons, these past few weeks have been unprecedented for energy markets on Australia's east coast, and we thank all our communities and customers for their understanding.

Ongoing significant maintenance activities have been carried out to ensure safety, integrity and efficiency of the station. This has included reverse osmosis water treatment plant works including placing it into hibernation for winter, inspections and testing of high voltage transformers and various specialist switch gear. We have had painters on site ensuring we keep any corrosion at bay, focusing on our gas lines including control and filtering equipment.

The team are busily preparing for further transformer outage works in November including instrument calibration, safety shut off testing and similar work and will be undertaking Gas Safety training in July when Origin personnel from our Mortlake, VIC site join us.

After what seems like an eternity, we look forward to hosting a site tour in August. If a site tour is something you are interested in, please contact Tania Carlos who can also discuss any questions or concerns you may have relating to the station

THE URANQUINTY ASSISTANT STATION MASTER'S HOUSE - by Barry Ryan

My name is Barry Ryan and I lived in Uranquinty some eighty years ago for a period of about 18 months but I have never forgotten the place. In fact I was known in some work circles as the "boy from Uranquinty" and I found it a great conversation starter. My late father, George Ryan, was transferred from Maitland to Uranquinty in late 1940 as an Assistant Station Master and my mother and my two brothers, John and Kevin, and I followed at the end of the school year. We moved into the Railway House across the street from the Catholic Church. I was offered a position in the State Public Service in July, 1942 and departed for the Big Smoke. My father was transferred to Tocumwal later the same year. I have visited Uranquinty many times over the years, the last time in February 2019 when a large group of my family attended Sunday Mass at Uranquinty on the way to Tocumwal to commemorate the seventy-fifth anniversary of my mother's death. I am currently living in residential care and during a recent lockdown period I was filling in the hours with my laptop. On a whim I keyed "Uranquinty" into Google and quite by accident discovered your wonderful web site.

The 1940s was part of the golden age of steam railways and NSW State Rail held an enviable, world-wide reputation for safety and efficiency. Uranquinty was, in those days, your typical railway town and the volume of traffic required a large number of station staff to cope with a 24 hour operation and strict compliance with Safe Working Practice And Procedures on a single track line. The Kywong line was in operation and the Air force Base generated an amount of business. It was not unusual to see a damaged Wirraway transported away on a long flat bed railway truck with the removed wings stacked alongside the fuselage.

The reason for our short stay in Uranquinty was my father's drive to achieve promotions through the grades by applying to fill vacancies in the less attractive locations. He was quite successful at this and consequently we moved about a lot but on the down side we were always the new kids at school. There were dozens of localities like Uranquinty but most of them now exist in virtually name only. I have spent some hours over recent weeks reading everything on the associated websites concerning Uranquinty and I am amazed at the development of the village as a most desirable place to live.

Our move from Maitland to Uranquinty at the end of 1940 was not the relatively simple operation of 2022. There was no phone call to a removalist who would pack, transport and unpack. We had to do the lot. We had a spare room which contained the paraphernalia for moving house. The main items were a number of tea chests,



many cardboard cylinders of about 20 centimeters in diameter and up to about 2 metres in length, huge quantities of newspapers, many jars of tacks, several hammers, several sets of pincers and some stout boxes for heavy items. As Dad was already in Uranquinty my brothers, mother and I had to do the lot.

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The furniture was taken to a railway station for loading into a van for rail transport to Uranquinty. This all took some time but the railway mafia took over and expedited the process. We stayed with relatives for a day or so and timed our arrival in Uranquinty for early morning which meant travelling by goods train for the latter part of the trip. Our goods and chattels were in the cottage awaiting unpacking.

The cottage had been cleaned by railway staff and there were people standing by to help with the unpacking and settling in. Railway people are a big family and they look after their own. My mother took over and indicated what lino was to go in each room. The lino was laid and sometimes trimmed to fit before the furniture could be moved into each room. The helpers took over and made easy work of the unpack. I still remember the day. By late afternoon we were finished and were having a snack and a rest when we were hit by an infamous Riverina red dust storm. My mother who was a strong woman broke down and cried and said "your father has brought us to a dump". Fortunately, a group of local ladies helped my mother set the house to rights and explained how to cope with the dust. Mum made a number of friends that day and changed her opinion of Uranquinty. Meals magically appeared for us for the first few days until we were properly settled.

Day two was restock the larder day and Mum learnt what could be bought where and when but she had tons of help from the local ladies. My brothers and I had to get a fowl house ready and acquire some poultry from somewhere. Against the back fence there was a large stack of building material including many lengths of timber, old weather boards and quite a large number of old but serviceable sheets of corrugated iron. The fowl house was no opera house but it did the job. We didn't have a cow and there was no intention to get one. By day three everything would have been ship shape and we would have had time to explore our new surroundings.
